We're delighted to honor **Stacey Abrams '99**, an alumni who is making history while championing the rights and voices of women, working families, and voters of color, with an award that has previously been presented to **U.S. Supreme Court Justice Sonia Sotomayor c/o 79**, former Secretary of State **Hillary Rodham Clinton c/o 73**, former Chief Justice of the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court **Margaret Marshall c/o 76**, civil rights activist **Marian Wright Edelman**, and Chief Executive Officer of Harambee Youth Employment Accelerator **Maryana Iskander c/o 03**.

Stacey Abrams delivered the Democratic State of the Union response in 2019. In 2018, she ran for governor of Georgia, a state that had never before elected a woman or person of color to serve as governor. In 2006, Stacey was elected to the Georgia House of Representatives. In 2010, she became the first woman ever to lead either party in the Georgia General Assembly, and the first African-American to lead in the House of Representatives.

We have Stacey as an inspiration and a role model, and we are so grateful she took time out of her wild schedule to come here today and share her thoughts so we can continue to learn from her.
